

Staying High and Dry

Welcome to the 17th Annual Capital Challenge

The remnants of Tropical Storm Nicole wreaked havoc in many cities on the Mid Atlantic coast, dropping over ten inches of rain in some areas causing streams and rivers to rise while roads closed due to flooding.

Rain always puts a damper on a horse show, but excessive rain can create unique challenges for horse show management. Keeping rings drained and stalls dry becomes a full-time job. The Prince George's Equestrian Center sits in the middle of the winding Western Branch of the Patuxent River, a tributary of the Chesapeake Bay.

The backside of the show grounds is especially close

to the water and is where management was keeping a close watch.

"The guys did an unbelievable job of keeping us dry," said show manager Oliver Kennedy. "They worked around the clock trenching and pumping, and hopefully the gusty winds will continue to dry us out. If it wasn't for our amazing crew, and the guys from the Equestrian Center, we would have seen some flooding. Everyone pitched in."

Co-manager Billy Glass added, "In order to accommodate the best show hunters in the world we have the best staff, and they did a phenomenal job. They went above and beyond the call of duty."



It's what every rider wants - the horse of a lifetime. Sometimes a partnership clicks immediately, sometimes it develops slowly. At some point, however, a rider becomes aware that their horse is special, whether it's because of the walls of blue ribbons or just the comforting knicker of a four-footed friend from down the aisle.


Pam Robertson Clingensmith, of Basking Ridge, NJ, was a blossoming young rider in the late 1960s when she was introduced to a 12.3-hand bay mare named "Kit Kat." A neighbor kept the pony in a two-stall barn with a small pasture in the backyard and Clingensmith began taking lessons on the mare. A few months later, Clingensmith got the surprise of her life, when Kit Kat was given to her as a birthday present. Her parents paid a modest \$500 for the pony.

Clingensmith and Kit Kat went on to a very successful local show career together. One highlight was during the 1971 show season, when the Pony Finals were held in New Jersey, bringing national caliber ponies and riders into Clingensmith's area for the Monmouth County Horse Show. Despite the stiff competition, Kit Kat prevailed in a Pony Hunter Stake class, beating perennial pony finals champion Liseter Gold Coin.

Over the years, Clingensmith's family received several purchase offers on Kit Kat, one as high as \$5000. No price, however, was enough to persuade them to sell Pam's pony - her horse of a lifetime! After Clingensmith finally outgrew Kit Kat, she was given to a family who participated in 4H and lived well into her thirties with them.

Meanwhile, Julia Wiley, of Vernon, NJ, had heard through her trainer Linda Mancini that a great children's jumper was for sale. His name was "Never Satisfied" and Wiley's purchase of the bay gelding commenced a long career with the Wiley family spanning from 2000 to 2008. Doogie, as he was known around the barn, was very fast around a jumper course. Wiley recalls that at their first horse show she fell off after asking him to turn in the air. He turned so quickly that she found herself on the ground. "I realized if I asked him to turn, I had better be ready," she said.

The pair won at major shows along the east coast in the children's/adult jumpers, including the Capital Challenge, Washington International and the Marshall & Sterling Finals. Doogie was so consistent that Wiley

admits they began to rely on him to pay the show bills, as they would often win the Classic and take home the winner's check. Wiley reminisced, "He was just an amazing hose that wanted to win as badly as I did."


Doogie's talents were not limited to the show ring, however. He found new life as a field hunter for Wiley's father. He was surefooted and brave and could whip-in or lead the field. Doogie eventually returned to the show ring for one more season with Wiley's younger sister Emily. They were champion at every show together, including Upperville. Unfortunately, Doogie contracted an infection and was put down in 2008. Yet his memory will live forever with the Wiley family who loved him dearly.
